The dream maker

This Make-A-Wish volunteer won't take "no" for answer.

etting people to say "yes" is Suzette Malkasian's specialty. She perfected the skill as the owner and top saleswoman of her own retail clothing store, and now uses her persuasive talents for brightening the lives of seriously ill children through the Make-A-Wish Foundation of Oregon.

In a decade of volunteer work with the charity, Suzette has been a "dream maker" for more than 40 children. She's never been told "no" by the businesses she contacts for donations. "And I've asked for a lot of stuff," she says, laughing at her own audacity.

Suzette's responsibility as a wish coordinator is to find out what the child wants and make it happen. Make-A-Wish is supported by some cash donations, but the charity relies heavily on the generosity of businesses to fulfill the dreams of children with lifethreatening illnesses who have typically undergone an intensive course of treatment.

Suzette has garnered donations from airlines, Disney World, Disneyland and many local businesses, including Costco, Dairy Queen and Dominos.

Her latest "wish child," Marcus, asked simply for a laptop computer. Suzette called the manager at Costco and asked the store to donate the computer and all the peripheral equipment. Then she arranged for Marcus and his family to travel to Costco in a stretch limo and be greeted at the door by applauding staff members. Next came the party, complete with cake, balloons and some very nice

magical as I can, especially if the child isn't getting on an airplane," Suzette says. "There's nothing in the world like walking into Disneyland. So if they're not doing that, I want the child to have that same feeling of never forgetting

"Suzette is such a great ambassador for the Make-A-Wish organization," says Michael Cotton, Costco's warehouse manager. "She is so passionate about her work. And extremely organized."

Not to mention creative and

determined. One of her wish children asked for a hot tub for the family. Suzette's supervisor was skeptical. No one had ever donated a hot tub before. Suzette not only got the tub, Cedar Works Spas donated its top-of-the-line product and arranged for the setup as

"It's so much fun," Suzette says. "People want to help."-

Suzette's goal is to someday pull off a no-cost wish. "So far my best is \$39 (cash outlay) for a \$4,000 wish," she reports, "but I'm determined to do one at zero.'

Suzette's volunteer efforts are especially important because not everyone can do the work. Many people have the misperception that all wish kids are terminally ill, and prospective volunteers often think it would be too depressing to get involved. The truth is that now most of the children eventually recover.

"People ask me how I do this," Suzette says. "What I do is focus on the positive aspect of making a difference in someone's life. I

forget that these kids are sick." For other volunteers, the most difficult task of being a wish coordinator is asking for donations. The responsibility terrifies them, and they often don't make

it through the training.

For Suzette, it's the easy part, and she feels perfectly matched for the job. "All you have to say is, 'On behalf of Make-A-Wish ...' she explains. "And people say, 'What can I do?"

Suzette does more than just ask for donations and plan parties. She also makes public presentations, helps with events and promotes the foundation at every opportunity.

"Her gift is building partnerships in the community to help make the best wish experience possible," says Kara Minkoff of the Make-A-Wish Foundation "Suzette inspires staff and volunteers. Her commitment to the mission is unwavering, and her ability to find creative solutions is endless."

Raised as a Catholic with the volunteer ethic built in, Suzette is also a member of Assistance League Eugene and volunteers with Riverbend hospital doing bereavement counseling. "I love that work, too," she says.
